Glossary of Key Terms



Gender

how you experience the world in relation to (or outside of) social, psychological, cultural, and behavioral qualities of femininity & masculinity



Transgender

individuals whose gender identity is different from the sex a doctor assigned to them at birth based on their anatomy. If you understand yourself to be a woman, you are a woman, regardless of anatomy.



Cisgender

individuals whose felt sense of gender identity matches their sex assigned at birth



Intersex

an umbrella term that describes bodies that fall outside the strict male/female binary. There are lots of ways someone can be intersex.



Transition (1)

the process of affirming and expressing one's internal sense of gender, rather than the one associated with sex assigned at birth



Transition (2)

Transitioning is different for everyone and can include adopting the outward or physical characteristics that match one's gender identity with gender affirming medical care, but not everyone has access to this.



Transition (3)

Social transitioning can look like coming out to friends and family, using a different name, using different pronouns, dressing and styling hair in ways that feel comfortable, and using your voice differently.



Transphobia

can include fear, aversion, anger, hatred, or violence towards people who do not conform to gender roles.



When a person's name and gender expression are different than their legal name and gender marker on their government IDs, it calls attention to their transness. In a transphobic society where government ID is required for essential activities in daily life, trans people are subject to discrimination, mistreatment, loss of employment, housing instability, and violence on a regular basis.

***Trans women of color are disproportionately subject to fatal transphobic violence.**



Everyone, be they trans, cis, nonbinary or agender, deserves accurate ID.

Transitioning is a process that unfolds over time. Trans people with additional social barriers face challenges navigating the legal name change process, prolonging their undue risk of violence.

Why might a survivor want to legally change their name?



Reasons can include:

- Changing a family name because of family violence. This could be family rejection based on LGBTQ+ identity or because of family trauma regardless of LGBTQ+ identity
- To avoid stalking, harrassment, doxxing, etc
- Changing a name shared with an abuser (applies to adults or children)
- Partnerships and chosen family (and not necessarily to do with marriage)



Initial Considerations



Disclaimer (1)

- State statutes cannot hold the full range and diversity of human experiences, especially Trans experiences.
- State statutes refer to "surgical" procedures, but many Trans people will not or do not want to pursue surgical procedures.



Disclaimer (2)

- We can assist folks with these processes while maintaining dignity and respect by:
 - refraining from referring to specific body parts, medical procedures, etc.
 - affirming that a person is who they are regardless of what any legal document may say.



Disclaimer (3)

Today's presentation focuses on name change processes for individuals 14 or older. There are similar processes for individuals younger than 14 that we are unable to cover in today's training.



No Legal Advice Allowed

We can share information on the process (how to complete forms, etc.). We cannot tell folks what they ***should*** do to get certain outcomes. We can share what we have observed, and different options that folks can consider. We focus on "could" (options) vs. "should".



No consistency in process from county to county, judge to judge, case to case.



Assessing Risk

An advocate's role is to provide support and resources to help a survivor assess their potential risks. Survivors are the experts on their own lives, but intentional fear mongering through anti-Trans rhetoric and executive orders creates heightened risk.

Provide valid and credible resources to help guide decision-making, such as the ACLU's FAQ on Passports, or Lambda Legal:

Notaries

- Some documents in some processes need to be notarized:
- Waiver of Court Fees
- Document attesting to gender marker change for legal gender marker change on WI birth certificate.
- Free notary services are available at local libraries and some municipalities.

- Court filing fee: \$164.40
- Name change publication: \$75 - 100
- Certified copies of court documents: \$7.50 each
- Recording to Register of Deeds: \$30
- WI Driver License: \$14-34
- WI Vital Records Update: \$10
- WI Birth Certificate: \$20
- Passport: \$165

Part 2: Prep for hearing

Filing with the clerk sets the hearing process in motion. The petitioner will be assigned a judge and hearing date. Follow the clerk's instructions, which vary by county. (Confidential name changes don't require the publication step.)

Publish the notice and order for name change hearing for three consecutive weeks. This can cost \$75-125.

Prepare required documentation for hearing: the previously filed forms, proof of publication affidavit, an official birth certificate, unexpired state ID, and proof of address if different than what's printed on ID.

Part 3: Attend hearing

Arrive 30 minutes early. Wear comfortable court appropriate clothing. Bring supportive folks.

Typically the judge verifies the information on the submitted forms and signs the order assuming requirements are met.

File name change order with county clerk of courts and order certified copies (at a cost of \$5-10 per copy).

Part 4: Update IDs and accounts

Update Social Security Card first

Update State ID a few business days after social security

Update name (and gender marker if desired) on birth certificate. Case number is same as name change.

Form Notes

Wisconsin state law prohibits those with a sex offense from changing their names. Petitioners will be asked on forms and in court if they are a registered sex offender.

Those who have employment that requires state licensure will need to go through additional processes.

Petitioners are asked to provide a reason for the name change. Safety plan with the survivor to ensure they are comfortable with what they put on the form and how they will answer this at the hearing.



Name Change Steps (1)

- Complete forms (including notarized waiver of fees if using).
- Go to your county's courthouse.
- Go to the Clerk of Courts to file the forms.
- Pay \$164.50 if not using waiver.
- (Check courthouse website ahead of time to see what forms of payment they take.)



Name Change Steps (2)

- Publish in the newspaper for 3 consecutive weeks.
- The clerk of courts should give instructions on what newspaper to publish in.
- Court dates are scheduled with enough time to complete the publication requirement.
- Don't delay to ensure proof of publication arrives in time for the hearing.
- Many newspapers have online forms for creating and paying for a public notice.



Name Change Steps (3)

- Receive proof of publication.
- (Call for an emailed copy if time is an issue.)
- Bring proof of publication; certified copy of birth certificate; current, unexpired ID and proof of address if different than ID; and funds for post-hearing fees.
 - Please note, some courts/judges may not ask to see each of these documents. Bring just in case.
- Arrive 30 minutes early and attend the hearing.



Hearing Considerations (1)

- Dress comfortably and appropriately!
- Bring a support person!
- Non-confidential name changes have been very straightforward in our observations.
- Bring proof of publication; certified copy of birth certificate; current, unexpired ID and proof of address if different than ID; and funds for post-hearing fees.
- Please note, some courts/judges may not ask to see each of these documents. Bring just in case.



Hearing Considerations (2)

Judges may ask petitioner what name and pronouns they should use on the record during the course of the hearing, others will insist on using current legal name until the hearing has concluded.

Be prepared to safety plan with the survivor around this!

Considerations (1)

**We cannot predict whether or not a judge will approve a confidential process.
Some judges have approved and some have denied, regardless of political
affiliation.**



Considerations (2)

Petitioners cannot choose which judge will hear their case, and we cannot predict what a judge will do in a particular case based on previous similar cases.



Considerations (3)

A petitioner without an attorney can submit any documentation along with the forms that they think might help their confidentiality request, including letters from mental health providers or police reports.



In the Matter of the Name Change of R.I.B. v. Brown County Circuit Court (1)

In January of 2023 the Wisconsin Court of Appeals ruled that a transgender teen was required to show that publication of his name change petition could expose him to *physical* danger in order for the petition to remain confidential.

In the Matter of the Name Change of R.I.B. v. Brown County Circuit Court (2)

The Court also held that the teenager failed to show that publishing the petition could expose him to harm because the people who had physically bullied him because of his gender identity in the past were already aware of his name change.

In the Matter of the Name Change of R.I.B. v. Brown County Circuit Court (3)

Impact of this ruling is unclear.

Some judges continue to determine that existing publicly as Trans is enough to prove the potential for physical harm.

Others will demand evidence such as police reports in order to "prove" the potential for physical harm.

Confidential Name Change Steps (1)

- Complete forms (including notarized waiver of fees if using).
- Go to the courthouse in the county in which the petitioner resides.
- Go to the Clerk of Courts to file the forms and any supporting documentation.
- Pay \$164.50 if not using waiver.
- (Check courthouse website ahead of time to see what forms of payment they take.)



Confidential Name Change Steps (2)

- The court may make a determination on confidentiality when you file.
- The court may follow up via phone or mail.
- The court may wait until the hearing to make a confidentiality determination.



Confidential Name Change Steps (3)

- Attend hearing
- Bring proof of publication; certified copy of birth certificate; current, unexpired ID and proof of address if different than ID; copies of any supplemental documentation; and funds for post-hearing fees.
 - Please note, some courts/judges may not ask to see each of these documents. Bring just in case.
- Petitioner should be prepared to answer in court as to why they asked for this to be confidential.
- If confidentiality is granted, hearing will proceed.
- If confidentiality is denied, petitioner may be asked to complete publication requirement and reschedule hearing.
- OR petitioner may be asked if the hearing can proceed as a public hearing with transcription.

Legal Gender Marker Change on WI Birth Certificate

Considerations

Notarized letter from a doctor

File forms

Attend hearing



If the survivor lives in Wisconsin but their birth certificate is from another state, they need to consult that state's vital records office for their gender marker change process.



We cannot predict how a judge will decide on a gender marker case. We have seen judges approve with no additional documentation required and we have seen judges deny when specific medical procedures have not been completed.



Text of Wisconsin state law says petitioner must have had a "surgical sex-change procedure" and we have seen judges of all kinds vary widely on their interpretation of this.



Those seeking legal gender marker change may want to consult an attorney if possible. Remember, any supplemental documentation can be submitted with the filing.



There are still ways to change gender marker on other documents including state ID without going through the court process. The court process is to change a Wisconsin birth certificate.



Notarized letter from a doctor

- Must submit a notarized letter from a doctor attesting that petitioner had a "surgical sex-change procedure."
- Many providers of gender-affirming care are already familiar with this process.
- Make sure to request a notarized letter.
- Get letter ready to file with the forms.

Legal Gender Change Steps

- Get notarized letter from a doctor
- Complete forms
- Go to county courthouse
- Go to the clerk's office
- Submit all forms including letter and waiver if using.
- Pay filing fees*



***Please note: If also filing for a name change the petitioner can file all forms at the same time for one case number.**



***Please note: If petitioner has previously filed and received a legal name change, they may be able to use the same case number and forgo a hearing.**

Depending on all factors, a judge may schedule a hearing or may make a determination and communicate that another way.

***Call clerk of courts for more info on their specific processes.**

Changing name and/or gender on other ID documents

Social Security

Name: Bring certified copy of name change order.

Gender: Cannot change gender marker on social security account, but it is OK if sex associated with SS account does not match other documents.

Bring required documents, fill out online forms.



DMV

Name: Bring certified order of name change to DMV

Gender M or F: Bring certified judge's order of gender marker change, OR bring a letter from a therapist or medical provider that states they are providing gender-affirming care

Gender X: DMV can change to gender marker X ONLY if X is on a passport or birth certificate. (Verified 8/13/25)

*Inconsistent knowledge and constantly changing processes can make this especially confusing.



Passport

Folks can still change gender marker on US Passports including to X (verified 8/11/25).

Submit certified order of name change with passport application to change name.
